£1 was divided into 20 silver shillings (20/-) One shilling (1/-) divided into 12 pennies (12d)

Gold Coins

Pre 1800 – **guinea** (21/-), **half guinea** and variations From 1800 - **sovereign** (£1) and **half sovereign** (10/-) and sometimes multiples (£2 or £5)

Silver Coins

were sterling silver (92.5% pure) up to 1919 then 50% silver 1920 to 1946 finally cupro-nickel from 1947.

One **crown** (5/-) was five shillings (in regular use to 1902, occasionally after and more recently for commemorative coins)

half crown (2/6d)

Florin or two shillings (2/-) from 1849 One shilling (or bob) (1/-) sixpence (or tanner) (6d) threepence (3d) up to c1945

'Copper' Coins

minted in **brass threepence** (1937+) (*thruppenybit*) (3d)
minted in **copper** up to 1860, then **bronze penny** (1d) **halfpenny** (½d)

farthing (= 'fourth-thing') - used up to 1950s (1/4d).

Charles II refused to face the same way on his coins as Oliver Cromwell who had faced left, so Charles II faced to the right. From then on, each king or queen faced the opposite way to the previous one.

For each coin, there are variations of design and portrait, particularly in a long reign like George III's and Victoria's. Other coins were occasionally introduced. Up to Victoria's reign, groats (4d) and half groats (2d) were regularly issued. Victoria issued a double-florin between 1887 and 1890 and also fractions of a farthing (for use in some colonies).

Coins are priced according to their rarity and condition.
